



Information loss, decision making, reviews -

Green Book on policy-making demands SMART objectives and review.

ECO3 launched in December 2018, ECO 2's value and impact knowingly unreported, and so not considered.

Simon Bittlestone - Audit Manager, National Audit Office:

• "The Energy Company Obligation is paid for through all consumers' bills...The Government used to publish a breakdown of how much each of these schemes cost and also how much they save...they have not produced those breakdowns since 2014, as far as I know, so there is a potential lack of transparency there. We looked across a few of these schemes, again going back a few years, in 2016." (Environmental Audit Committee, 2020)"

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
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Installations by technology per quarter (non-cumulative)






How do we engage the Owner Occupier?

Current Government action.

- "There is currently no Government strategy to engage the public in the transition to a low-carbon and climate resilient economy. This will need to change." (Climate Change Committee, 2020)
- "Cost of reaching Net Zero by 2050 is estimated to be circa 1% p.a. of GDP per year to 2050". Roughly £50-70B p.a. (Institute for Government, 2020)

Owner Occupier "Elephant" – it needs a reason to go...


• Motivations matter.

Relationships and Engagement areas of risk:

"Embedding Cultural Change" & "Business Engagement".

Maximum significance – without engagement a social system ceases to function.

Additional considerations:

- Free to a customer does not mean "yes please"... objections exist.
- Green Book optimism bias costs, program timings... end user engagement?



So what is actively being done at present?

Reply from MHCLG re request for a taxonomy of policy and regulation in the domestic housing energy efficiency arena:

"... To deliver the necessary improvements to existing homes across tenures, the government is developing interventions tailored to each housing tenure. The government has:

- consulted on improving minimum energy efficiency standards (MEES) in the private rented sector,
- committed to consult on regulatory measures to improve the energy performance of owner occupied homes,
- has consulted on improving energy efficiency through mortgage lenders, and

• committed to review the Decent Homes Standard to consider how it can better support the decarbonisation of homes in the social rented sector

However, the Heat and Buildings Strategy, to be published in due course, will set out the actions the Government will take for reducing emissions from buildings, across tenures..."




Summary: it is generally agreed that we need -

A fabric first approach.

Avoid pollution lock in eg gas boilers.

Nemo Resideo – supportive funding streams.



However,

No credible engagement plan for Owner Occupiers (CCC, 2020).

No equivalent replacement for their most engaging policy levers to date.

No large-scale, specific, accessible financial packages in place.

No active consultation on regulatory compliance to improve energy efficiency.
